GENERAL SHOW REGULATIONS

This show is governed by the standard rules, regulations, and guidelines of the American Rose Society (ARS). Specific rules for Division I - Horticulture, and Division II - Rose Arrangements, precede respective Class descriptions.

1. Entries are accepted from 7:30 to 10:00 A.M., Sunday, June 1, 2003 at the Shilo Inn. Those received after 10:00 A.M. may be displayed only. The Placement Committee will place all entries, except Challenges and Rose Arrangements, which are placed by the exhibitor. Only assigned persons will be allowed in exhibit room between 10:00 A.M. and 1:00 P.M. No exhibits or awards may be removed before 6:00 P.M. Sunday, without the permission of the Show Chair. All awards must be checked out to the winner (or representative) by the Awards Committee at 6:00 P.M. Entries not removed by 6:05 P.M. become property of the Tri-City Rose Society.
2. Competition is open to all rose growers regardless of residence. Exhibitors entering in "Junior" classes must be age 17 and under, exhibit roses from rose bushes they have cared for, and prepare the exhibit. Exceptions are noted in the schedule for Junior Arrangements, Division II, Section M.
3. Entry tags and containers, except as noted in the schedule, will be provided by the Tri-City Rose Society. All entries must be accompanied by an entry tag filled out with Section, Class, Variety name, and exhibitor's Name and Address on the tag, folded with name concealed, and attached to the container, or placed on the table in front of the Challenge or Rose Arrangement Class exhibit. Failure to do so will disqualify the exhibit.
4. Rose varieties must be recognized by the ARS and exhibited by the recognized ARS Exhibition Name as listed in the current "Handbook for Selecting Roses," "American Rose" magazine, and "Rose Annual," and classified in accordance with these publications or the current "Modern Roses" or "Combined Rose List."
5. First, second, third, and fourth place ribbons will be awarded in each Class where warranted. ARS certificates and awards, and Tri-City Rose Society trophies, awards, and prizes will be awarded to the highest scoring first place winners. Awards are listed with their respective Class and cannot be transferred. An asterisk(*) preceding the trophy name indicates it will be retired when one person has won it three (3) times, not necessarily consecutively. A prize is meant to be kept by the winner. The judges decision will be final. A committee consisting of the Show Chair, Judges Chair, and Schedule Chair has final procedural authority.
6. The Tri-City Rose Society, its officers and committee members will not be held responsible for any loss or damage to any person or property.

DIVISION I – HORTICULTURE

DIVISION I - HORTICULTURE RULES

1. All horticulture entries must have been grown by the exhibitor in his own private outdoor garden.
2. All roses in all horticulture classes, excluding Challenge Classes, will be alphabetically arranged and judged. Each named variety is grouped as a subclass and the variety will be judged on its own merits, even though only one rose of a variety might be entered. Ribbons and awards will be awarded as warranted.
3. Only ONE entry of the same variety will be allowed from the same garden in any one class. More than one entry will disqualify all entries involved.
4. One bloom per stem specimens may be naturally grown with no sidebuds, or disbudded. Other than one bloom per stem specimens should be shown as naturally grown, but an exhibitor may remove unwanted growth subject to possible penalization.
5. Only clear plastic wrap or plant material is permitted to support specimen stems, but is not to extend above the top of the container.
6. Entries will be disqualified for the following reasons: misnamed, misclassified, misplaced (unless misplaced by the Entries Committee), unlabeled or mislabeled, stem-on-stem (Exception: Old Garden Roses may be exhibited stem-on-stem. One bloom per stem Hybrid Perpetuals, Teas, and Noisettes are not included in this exception), presence of a foreign substance, not disbudded when required, violation of ARS or local society show rules, and non-ARS recognized roses.
7. Judging will be according to the ARS "Guidelines for Judging Roses" and be performed by ARS Accredited Rose Judges and apprentices. The ARS point scoring system, shown below, will be used for judging specimens. For Challenge Classes, an additional ten (10) points per specimen should be added for overall appearance of the collection.

In Challenge Classes, the overall appearance is given consideration, as well as the individual specimens. Exhibits should be as pleasing to the eye as possible; using harmonizing colors, blooms in the same stage of development, proportionate heights, etc. Where mixed types of roses are exhibited, each of the types is judged: then the overall appearance of the exhibit is considered. Varieties must be CORRECTLY IDENTIFIED on entry tag. All entries will be judged Avariety against variety.”

DIVISION II - ROSE ARRANGEMENTS

DIVISION II - ROSE ARRANGEMENTS RULES

By entering this show given under the American Rose Society rules, exhibitors agree to abide by the following rules.

1. Arrangement exhibitors may place their own entries between 7:30 and 10:00 A.M. The Arrangement Placement Committee will assist in the specific placement of arrangements. No one but the exhibitor may touch or move an arrangement. However, if all efforts to locate the arranger have failed, the Arrangement Placement Committee may carefully move an arrangement.
 2. All roses must be outdoor garden grown and must be of high quality.
 3. A rose or roses must be the dominant flower in all arrangements.
 4. Names of all roses in each arrangement must be written on entry tag.
 5. To be eligible for an ARS medal certificate, roses must be arranger grown and “**AG**” or “**arranger grown**” must be written on entry tag.
 6. ONE entry per exhibitor is allowed in each class, but an exhibitor may enter as many classes as desired.
 7. Accessories are allowed unless stated otherwise in the schedule. Flowers other than roses, and dried and/or treated dried plant material are allowed unless prohibited by the schedule.
 8. A card of intent may be included with an arrangement as an explanation of the arranger’s interpretation of the theme or class title.
 9. An arrangement incorrectly placed in one class when it should have been in another will be judged in the class in which it is placed.
 10. All exhibits must be the work of the exhibitor.
 11. Miniature arrangements will be displayed on small pedestals provided by the Tri-City Rose Society and are to be judged at eye level.
 12. Judging will be according to the ARS “Guidelines for Judging Rose Arrangements,” by ARS accredited rose arrangement judges and apprentices and/or accredited garden club arrangement judges, using ARS scorecard for judging rose arrangements.
- Infringement of the following rules will result in severe penalty of an arrangement.**
13. Painted or dyed fresh plant materials, and live creatures are not allowed.
 14. The use of plant materials on the state or local conservation lists is not permitted.
 15. The American flag or flag of any country may not be used in an arrangement or as a decoration in any way.
- Infringement of the following rules will result in disqualification of an arrangement.**
16. Roses not outdoor grown.
 17. Use of artificial plant material.

The ARS Gold, Silver, and Bronze Medal Arrangement Certificates may be awarded to classes 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 10 and 26 if eligibility requirements are met.

The ARS Gold, Silver, and Bronze Miniature Medal Arrangement Certificates may be awarded to classes 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18 and 27 if eligibility requirements are met.

Eligibility requirements for both standard and miniature arrangements:

1. Roses in the arrangement must be outdoor arranger grown.
2. Design must be first place ribbon winner scoring 92 points or more.
3. The designation “**arranger grown**” or **AG** must be on the entry tag.
4. Correct names of the rose(s) must be written on the entry tag.

Class 6 "The Pacific Rim" Design in the Oriental Manner using a low container.

Class 7 "Live Long and Prosper" Design in the Oriental Manner using a tall container.

ARS ORIENTAL AWARD Roses must be CORRECTLY IDENTIFIED on entry tag, but need not be arranger-grown. Awarded to highest scoring first place winner with 92 points or more.

BEST ARRANGEMENT IN THE ORIENTAL MANNER (ARS Oriental Award winner, if awarded.) Prize from Loraine and Don Doyle.

SECTION D - CORSAGES AND NOSEGAYS

Provide own unobtrusive staging. Covered ice packs may be used.

Class 8 "American Bandstand" Corsage for a school prom using fresh roses. Other fresh flowers, fresh plant material, and ribbons may be used. To be worn for adornment.

Class 9 "American Dream" Nosegay for a bridesmaid using fresh roses. Other fresh flowers, fresh plant material, doilies, hankies, and ribbons may be used. To be carried in hand.

BEST CORSAGE OR NOSEGAY Prize from Helen Newman.

SECTION E - NOVICE ARRANGEMENTS

Open to arrangers who have never won an arrangement trophy or ARS Award, but may have won up to six first place ribbons in arrangement competition, in an ARS show. Roses must be outdoor garden grown, but not necessarily arranger grown. The American flag is not permitted for use.

Class 10 "God Bless America" Designer's Choice using standard-size roses.

BEST NOVICE ARRANGEMENT Prize from Rhoda Lewis.

DIVISION II - ROSE ARRANGEMENTS

SECTION F - JUDGES ARRANGEMENTS

This section is open only to arrangement judges who are judging the other arrangement sections of this show. These judges may not enter any other section in Division II. This section will be judged by Tri-City Rose Society ARS accredited rose arrangement judges who may not enter in this section, but are allowed to enter all other sections in Division II.

Class 11 “Proud to be an American” Designer’s Choice using standard-size roses.

Class 12 “Stars and Stripes” Designer’s Choice using miniature/mini-flora roses, not to exceed 10 inches in height, width, or depth, including container, base, and accessories.

ARS BEST JUDGES ENTRY Roses must be CORRECTLY IDENTIFIED on entry tag, but need not be arranger-grown. Awarded to highest scoring first place winner with 92 points or more.

BEST JUDGES ARRANGEMENT (ARS Best Judges Entry winner, if awarded.) Prize by Dorothy and Jim Campbell.

SECTION G - TRADITIONAL ARRANGEMENTS USING MINIATURE/ MINI-FLORA ROSES

Class 13 “United We Stand” Small Mass Design, not to exceed 10 inches in height, width, or depth, including container, base, and accessories.

Class 14 “National Pride” Miniature Line Design, not to exceed 5 inches in height, width, or depth, including container, base, and accessories.

ARS MINI-ROYALTY AWARD Roses must be CORRECTLY IDENTIFIED on entry tag, but need not be arranger-grown. Awarded to highest scoring first place winner with 92 points or more.

BEST TRADITIONAL ARRANGEMENT USING MINIATURE ROSES (ARS Mini-Royalty Award winner, if awarded.) The WASHINGTON MUTUAL SAVINGS BANK TROPHY and prize from The Bryant Family.

SECTION H - MODERN ARRANGEMENTS USING MINIATURE/MINI-FLORA ROSES

Class 15 “Good Morning America” Small Modern Line-Mass Design, not to exceed 10 inches in height, width, or depth, including container, base, and accessories.

Class 16 “A Shining Legacy” Miniature Designer’s Choice, not to exceed 5 inches in height, width, or depth, including container, base, and accessories.

DIVISION II - ROSE ARRANGEMENTS

SECTION H - MODERN ARRANGEMENTS USING MINIATURE/MINI-FLORA ROSES(continued)

ARS MINI-ARTIST=S AWARD Roses must be CORRECTLY IDENTIFIED on entry tag, but need not be arranger-grown. Awarded to highest scoring first place winner with 92 points or more.

BEST MODERN ARRANGEMENT USING MINIATURE ROSES (ARS Mini-Artist's Award winner, if awarded.) Prize from JoAnn Brehm.

SECTION I - ARRANGEMENTS IN THE ORIENTAL MANNER USING MINIATURE/MINI-FLORA ROSES

Class 17 "Light from Above" Small Design in the Oriental Manner using a tall container, not to exceed 10 inches in height, width, or depth, including container, base, and accessories.

Class 18 "Born Free" Miniature Design in the Oriental Manner using a low container, not to exceed 5 inches in height, width, or depth, including container, base, and accessories.

ARS MINI-ORIENTAL AWARD Roses must be CORRECTLY IDENTIFIED on entry tag, but need not be arranger-grown. Awarded to highest scoring first place winner with 92 points or more.

BEST ARRANGEMENT IN THE ORIENTAL MANNER USING MINIATURE ROSES (ARS Mini-Oriental Award winner, if awarded.) Prize from Dorothy and Jim Campbell.

SECTION J - ROSECRAFTS USING DRIED ROSES

A design using dried roses (any size rose) as dominant factor. Natural dried materials may be used, such as dried or treated foliage, cones, pods, and ribbons or bows.

Class 19 "Lady Liberty" Door or Wall Hangings, Wreaths

Class 20 "Land that We Love" Pictures, Picture Frames, or Plaques.

Class 21 "Home of the Brave" Corsages, Potpourri, Jewelry, etc.

ARS ROSECRAFT AWARD Roses must be CORRECTLY IDENTIFIED on entry tag, but need not be arranger-grown. Awarded to highest scoring first place winner with 92 points or higher.

BEST ROSECRAFT (ARS Rosecraft Award winner, if awarded.) Prize from Linda and Richard Kerkof.

DIVISION II - ROSE ARRANGEMENTS

SECTION K - STANDARD ARRANGEMENTS USING DRIED ROSES

An arrangement using dried roses, with or without dried and/or treated rose foliage, and/or other dried natural plant materials. Contrived flowers made from natural dried plant material also may be used. Roses must predominate. No plastic, paraffin-dipped, or artificial plant material is allowed. Arrangement must be in a suitable container.

Class 22 “A Hope for Peace” Mass Design.

Class 23 “Reaching out to Others” Line-Mass design.

ARS KEEPSAKE AWARD Roses must be CORRECTLY IDENTIFIED on entry tag, but need not be arranger-grown. Awarded to highest scoring first place winner with 92 points or higher.

SECTION L - MINIATURE ARRANGEMENTS USING DRIED ROSES

An arrangement using dried miniature/mini-flora roses, with or without dried and/or treated rose foliage, and/or other dried natural plant materials. Contrived flowers made from natural dried plant material also may be used. Roses must predominate. No plastic, paraffin-dipped, or artificial plant material is allowed. Arrangement must be in a suitable container.

Class 24 “Parade of Nations” Mass Design.

Class 25 “God Bless the USA” Designer’s Choice.

ARS MINI-KEEPSAKE AWARD Roses must be CORRECTLY IDENTIFIED on entry tag, but need not be arranger-grown. Awarded to highest scoring first place winner with 92 points or higher.

SECTION M - JUNIOR ARRANGEMENTS

An arrangement created by individuals age 17 years and under. The word “**Junior**” should be written on entry tag. Roses must be outdoor garden grown, but need not be arranger grown. The American flag is not permitted for use.

Class 26 “Yankee Doodle Dandy” Designer’s Choice using standard -size roses.

Class 27 “Rising Star” Designer’s Choice using miniature/mini-flora roses, not to exceed 10 inches in height, width, or depth, including container, base, and accessories.

ARS JUNIOR ARRANGEMENT AWARD Roses must be CORRECTLY IDENTIFIED on entry tag, but need not be arranger-grown. Awarded to highest scoring first place winner with 92 points or more.

BEST JUNIOR ARRANGEMENT (ARS Junior Arrangement Award winner, if awarded.) Prize from Norma Boswell.
